PETER FORD TO SPEAK AT ROSE HISTORY AUDITORIUM



Museum Wins Award For Design

CORE Construction won the annual prestigious Sand Dollar Award in recognition for public buildings from The Collier Building Industry Association on Sept. 17, 2011. The award represents the highest industry achievement for design, engineering, site work, construction, excellence, and function.

It was given in recognition of CORE's work with the MIHS to construct the Marco Historical Museum complex therefore, fulfilling a dream of a historical museum dedicated to tell Marco Island's unique story beginning with the ancient Calusa culture, the pioneer era, and the Deltona period of modern Marco.

Author and musician, Peter Ford will speak at the Rose History Auditorium on Tuesday, November 15, 2011 at 7 PM followed by a book signing of his newest book GLENN FORD: A LIFE, and the movie "Gilda".

Peter is the son of Glenn Ford, renowned film star, and Eleanor Powell, MGM's "first lady of film dance"). He grew up with legends Eddie Cantor, Sophie Tucker, Al Jolson, Mary Pickford, Clark Gable, Bette Davis, James Mason - often his babysitter, and Charlie Chaplin who lived next door.

After graduating from Santa Monica College, Peter pursued a career as an actor and singer. He was responsible for Bill Haley and the Comet's song, "Rock Around the Clock" being used as the theme song of his father's film, "Blackboard Jungle" in 1953. He eventually formed his own group, The Creations.

Peter appeared in eight movies with his father as well as many other movies, television shows, and stage productions. He eventually left acting and singing and became a licensed contractor and built and remodeled homes for many of the most famous people in Hollywood. By the time he retired from building in 1996, his work had been published in architectural magazines across the world. Later, he hosted a successful late-night political talk show on radio.

Peter met his wife, Lynda, when they were both students at USC. They have been married for over 40 years and have three children.

His latest endeavor is his book discussing his father, GLENN FORD, A LIFE, which will be shared with Marco Island on November 15.

The lecture/presentation is free and open to the public.

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The Headstone Project by Craig Woodward

Who is Elizabeth (Lizzie) Weeks Sawyer? Lizzie was the wife of the first settler of Collier County, who moved here in 1862, and is buried in the Marco Island Cemetery. Lizzie

died in 1939 in the middle of the depression and although there were four generations of Weeks living on the Island at the time, the family was not affluent. However, her grave site is clearly visible as her sons poured a tabby mortar slab in which they originally scratched her name into the surface.

Tabby mortar is made by burning oyster shells to make a "quick lime", (the cement), then adding washed sand along with shell as the aggregate. It is a time consuming process but is relatively inexpensive, being made solely from natural materials.

Over the years, 93 grave sites have been found, many overgrown and damaged. Now, an effort is being made to put up a suitable headstone for Lizzie Weeks Sawyer.

The cemetery is operated by the New Life Community Church and Pastor Thomas McCulley has agreed to provide a headstone at cost. So, how can you help? Faye Brown, Lizzie's great-granddaughter has donated 20 of her books, "Weeks Family Connections" to the cause. Each book sells for \$20.00 and can be purchased at the Marco Island History Museum Store. The book includes a great deal of local history including information on the family's involvement in the Seminole wars and what life was like on Marco and in Collier County during the 1930's to the 1960's.

Also, donations are being accepted to be used to provide other markers for pioneer grave sites which have been missing or have broken headstones. Checks are to be made out to the Marco Island Historical Society, Inc.

I would just like to update the Marco Island Historical Society on the next exhibit that is going to be featured at the Marco Island Historical Museum. We will be featuring the exhibit entitled "Against All Odds: The Art of the Highwaymen", on loan from the Orange County Regional History Center. This exhibit showcases the painting of the Florida Highwaymen, who began as a group of African American artists who despite the segregated South of the 50's and 60's, prospered selling their paintings. One of the artist developed a fast method of painting that he shared with 25 others and collectively they have produced more than 200,000 paintings over a 30-year period.

This exhibit will open with a reception at 6:00 p.m. on December 9th at the Marco Island Historical Museum and will run until the end of February.

The MIHS MEWS How Did Marco Island Get its Name?

What's in a name? There is a certain amount of truth to the old saying, "a rose by any other name would still smell as sweet." So wouldn't Marco Island still be a tropical paradise by any other name? Of course it would! Still, it is interesting to explore the origins of how Marco Island received its name.

The Spaniards, in search of silks, gold and jewels christened the largest of the Ten Thousand Islands in the 1500's. The only human inhabitants of Marco Island then were scores of Calusa Indians who thrived on the abundant clams, mussels, oysters, and other seafood in the area. The Calusas thought Marco Island to be sacred because the hurricanes which came howling up from the Caribbean Sea spun counter clockwise and always seemed to move around the island. Carbon dating of artifacts unearthed from clam and oyster shell mounds on Marco indicate that man (probably Calusas) lived here approximately 5,000 years ago, well before the birth of Christ. Ancient dwelling sites have been discovered.

In the mid-1500's, when Spain was exploring most of Florida, the Spaniards stumbled upon a large island which contained two artesian springs located near what is now known as Caxambas Pass. The island became a favorite place to fill casks with fresh water for the return trip to Spain.

It eventually became known to all future sailors as "La Isla de San Marco" - the island of Saint Mark, named for Saint Mark, the Christian evangelist and traditional author of the second gospel in the Bible. As the years went by, the site became known as San Marco Island (Saint Marco's Island, and finally just Marco Island.

Have you ever observed the camera and the man behind it at the MIHS monthly meetings? Meet Bill Hughes!

Bill was raised in central New York on "the" farm, into an old family. He received his degree from DUNY of New York at Morrisville in Agriculture and English and furthered his education at the University of Georgia, also in Agriculture.

After school, he worked in the field of water quality and technology., personally being responsible for several of Americas heaviest industrial sites and was a certified water treatment process specialist. All this while he and his wife raised 3 children.

Before it was too late, Bill and his wife Yvonne, toured as entertainers in large East Coast Resorts and then they settled in Naples, Florida. Today, they still entertain for many groups and organizations.

You Never Know Who You'll Meet!!!



He was kind enough to share some Marco Island old family photos with us plus some photos of the original Olde Marco Inn. Knowing I am passionate about genealogy, he also shared his family history. Glenn lives in Massachusetts and had never visited Marco Island. He likes it so much, he plans on a return visit.

I also worked at the store Saturday of the same week and was told that the great-great-grandson of W.T. Collier was in the museum. His grandmother was Emma White Collier Ludlow, known as "Nanny", also a daughter of Captain Bill. Carson grew up on Marco Island and was here for the "Roots of Marco's Past", a MIHS program in 2008. Her uncle was Preston Sawyer, "The Caxambas Kid". Carson also shared his family history and Glenn Dugger's name is listed, but the cousins had never met. 
