Plans Revealed for Pioneer Exhibit

In what is becoming a springtime tradition here at the Marco Island Historical Museum (MIHM), we are excited to offer our members a preview of the latest permanent exhibit under development: *Pioneer Marco: A Tale of Two*



Villages. After months of consultation and collaboration with Collier County Museums and the Marco Island Historical Society, Creative Arts Unlimited, Inc. has produced its first renderings of the new exhibit. The design and fabrication team at Creative Arts is the same one that produced the popular *Modern Marco Island* and award-winning *Paradise Found: 6,000 Years of People on Marco Island* exhibits at the MIHM in 2014 and 2015.

The exhibit will chronicle the evolution of the pioneer villages at Marco and Caxambas, offering visitors an in-depth look at the people, industries, and lifestyles on Marco Island during the late 1800's and early 1900's. Rare photographs and objects will be brought to life by dynamic and engaging displays. The most prominent feature will be an immersive Florida "cracker cabin," inside which visitors will be able to sit and watch films about Marco's history. Other exciting elements will include digital projections, original animations and artwork, a replica Collier City archway, built-in video displays, and a touch-screen display for browsing materials from the MIHS archives. The museum is going "high-tech" to engage visitors with a decidedly "low-tech" period in Marco's history.

When completed, *Pioneer Marco* will bridge the gap between the *Paradise Found* and *Modern Marco* exhibits, marking an important milestone for the museum. The "phase one" completion of the three permanent exhibits, all opening within a roughly two-year span, will catapult the museum into "phase two," which will see the enhancement of these exhibits through the installation of new displays, interactives, and loan artifacts. We are excited about

the future of our museum exhibits and can't wait to share them with you soon. *Pioneer Marco* will open to the public in late 2016. Announcements will be distributed when the opening date is finalized. Stay tuned and visit <u>www.themihs.org</u> for updates.

We look forward to opening the doors of this breathtaking room in the late fall 2016/ early winter 2017. John is creating a spectacular mural to complement the Pioneer Period on the museum's south side. Thanks to the creativity of our friends at AP Builders and the magic of John Agnew's art work, those pipes are encased in a three sided column (see photo) that John is illustrating (see his "rough" sketch below). We will be offering this rare piece as the final naming opportunity for our Windows & Doors to History.

Mt. Rushmore Comes to Life

The idea for *The Men of Rushmore and Their Wives*, which was presented at the Rose History Auditorium last month, began as a brainstorming session over lunch with Gayle Thawley, Education Committee Chair for the Marco Island Historical Society, and Gina Sisbarro, a well-known writer, producer and director on the Island.

Thawley explained the Society's mission to bring history into the classroom usually using the talents of various Re-enactors and told her she was looking for a new project. Sisbarro's response was, "Let's do one better. Let's do a play. I will write it...cast it with my young actors...direct it. We'll put it on for the community and make it free for school kids...it will be entertaining enough so that little kids will giggle as well as get some information about the Presidents and their lives." Plus, we'll give the adults "some facts about the Presidents that they probably never knew before."

The order of Sisbarro's 4-part play follows the carvings of Mt. Rushmore, from left to right, and explores each President's tenure at different times in their lives. Vernon, Jefferson is about to be President, Lincoln is already in office and Roosevelt is considering There were laughs a plenty for both kids and adults interspersed with the more serious aspects of politics and customs of the times, especially considering today's political scene. But don't be fooled into thinking this was a kids' production. Yes, the cast was young—the average age 15—but many of these young adults started in theater when they were five or six years old.

"This is not baby time. These are all veteran actors, some of them with over ten years of experience and several productions behind their belt. They've been with me for a long time," says Sisbarro. "I basically wrote the play to fit their personalities." In costume and makeup, "they are so good, you really see who they portray—not teens performing." The actors came from several area schools including the Marco Island Academy, Lely, Marco Island Middle School and Tommie Barfield; another is home-schooled. All of these young people volunteered their services for this production as did their director Sisbarro. "We all have been with each other since we've been little kids," said Hurtley. "We're like a big family." The play was an unmitigated success, with a full audience for three performances. Perhaps long-time Historical Society



member and Re-enactor Marion Nicolay, who is blind and could only hear the actors, said it best. "I thought you told me these were kids. They were wonderful... sounded so professional and their lines were so complicated...not easy to memorize. This was the first collaboration of the Historical Society, Sisbarro and area-wide students but not the last. "We were thrilled by the reaction to our efforts to bring history to life," said Pat Rutledge, MIHS Executive Director and President of the Board. "Expect more high-quality performances in the future."

The Olds Family Collection

As we're gearing up for the opening of the Pioneer Exhibit later this year, Austin and I have spent some time going through pioneer-era materials in the MIHS collection. The people who lived on Marco during this time were nothing less than remarkable. It's sometimes hard to image Marco apart from the Deltona promotions and development, but many people lived here when natural vegetation flourished, bugs were almost unbearable, and picnics on the beach included wearing proper dress. We are lucky at the MIHS to have firsthand accounts of life on Marco in the early 20th century from the diaries, photographs, and letters of the Olds family. Charles and Mary Olds served as holistic doctors and farmers, while their three daughters, Orida, Saloma, and Rosalie, offer a unique and young point-of-view of living on Marco through their first-person accounts and photography. The Olds Family Collection, which consists of 341 photographs, 182 documents, 43 objects, and 2 diaries, was generously donated to the MIHS in 2011 by Martha Olds Adams, the great niece of Charles and Mary Olds. Former MIHS President and award-winning author Elizabeth Perdichizzi is largely to thank for the donation, corresponding with Mrs. Adams over the course of eight years as she carefully transcribed the diaries and letters for publication in her popular book "Into the Florida Wilderness: Pioneer Life and Medicine in Southwest Florida, A Journey with Drs. Mary and Louis Olds."

One of the ongoing efforts in the collections department is continuing to bring storage conditions of objects up to museum standards. The Olds Family Collection is a relatively fragile collection in terms of physical quality and, due to its enormous historical importance, was deemed "priority one" in our long-term overhaul. Each item from the collection was carefully scanned, cataloged, and housed appropriately. Not only are the Olds family materials now housed in museum-quality archival boxes, but the diaries, letters, and photographs are safely accessible for research and browsing without threatening the physical condition of the fragile objects. I find digitization to be an extremely important preservation mechanism for museum collections today and one that we will continue to employ in the MIHS collections as a preservation tool and for reaching broader audiences moving forward.

"It was perfectly beautiful all along the road [to Marco]. There were little ponds with tiny mangrove islands in them and palms and pines beyond; then there was a long vista where trees came up close on each side of the road, then more ponds, next a cluster of palms, and so on till we reached Marco." -Saloma Olds (January 1, 1914)

<u>Wild and Remote: Photographing South Florida By Canoe</u> Photography Exhibition by Connie Mier May 3 – July 26, 2016



The Marco Island Historical Museum is honored to feature '*Wild and Remote: Photographing South Florida by Canoe'*, a collection of photographs by artist Connie Mier May 3 – July 26, 2016 in our Traveling Exhibit Gallery.

Connie Mier is a wildlife and nature photographer who derives inspiration from her canoe explorations of the Everglades and Biscayne Bay. She often spends days at a time canoeing and camping in the Everglades to photograph some of the most remote wilderness areas in Florida. As a result, her photographs offer a rare glimpse of these beautiful places, as seen from a canoe.

"I have chosen to go deep into the Everglades to seek out birds and other wildlife, and to explore the dense mangrove forests and remote storm-swept beaches," shares Mier. "I want people to look at my image and feel as if they are there with me. I want the viewer to see a part of the Everglades they have never thought existed."

In addition to winning photo contests, including the 2015 National Audubon Society's fine art category, Connie's work has been published in several magazines, including *Wildlife Photographic*, *Canoe Roots*, *Outdoor Photographer* and *Extraordinary Vision*.

Exhibit focuses on Isles of Capri

From February through April, the museum featured the exhibit The *Isles of Capri…A Place in Time*, a collection of colorful and whimsical watercolors by local artist Donald Sunshine. Sunshine, an award-winning architect and author as well, collaborated with local historian Betsy Perdichizzi to provide the information for the placarding. Later, in April, both the artist and the historian got together again to lead a *Gallery Talk* in the museum, which focused on some of the charming stories of the fishing village and its development.

When asked what he would do when he finally ran out of places to document, Sunshine, prodded by his wife Joanna, said, "Perhaps then I'll really start thinking about retirement." Both events were open to the public and free of charge
